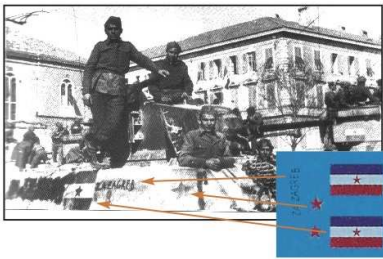


Yugoslav Army, WW2 72018

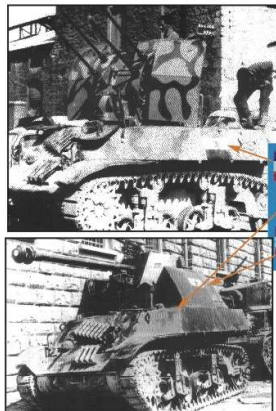
The Yugoslav Army fought in the Balkans in 1945 against the German and Italian oppressors. Their vehicles were mostly obtained from American or Russian stocks. Therefore, the vehicles generally obtained their original colour, often including the original vehicle code numbers and stars. So respectively in American and British Olive Drab or Russian Green; other colours when indicated.

Stuart M3A3

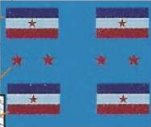
1st Tank Brigade, Sibenik. National flags on the side of the hull, red star on the oblique front part. The slogan 'To Zagreb' is written on both sides of the national flag, but in this instance, the bigger one has been painted over. The impression of camouflage colours is deceptive: the tank hull is just very dirty - the turret shows the original color.



Stuart FLAK and PAK



The Stuart Flak is camouflaged by painting a muddy yellow, comparable to

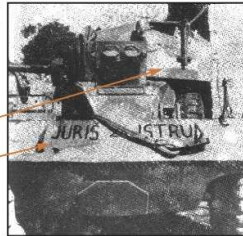


German dark yellow, over the original color. The national flag is on the side. Apparently

the hull gun has been removed. With the Stuart Pak, not only does the upper protective side sport the national flag, it also carries the red star on the oblique front side of the hull.

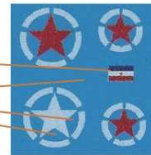
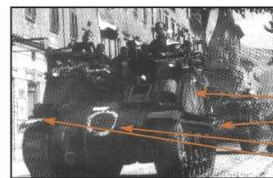
AEC A/C

As many members of the 11th Brigade came from the Istria region, this slogan is easily explained: 'Charge to Istria'. The national flag is on both sides of the turret. There is evidence that some AEC's, this one included, were painted in a camouflage scheme of mud yellow over the original British Olive Drab.

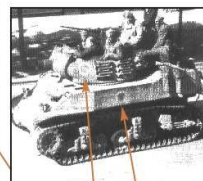


M7 Priest

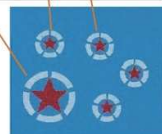
Rijeka, may 1945. This Priest sports the star-in-roundel on the hull front, sides and on the engine doors. In the latter case, the star itself has remained white. It seems there is a national flag on the right front fender. Note the machine gun, which has been removed from the 'pulpit' to the back of the vehicle. Also, this vehicle carries a national flag.



M8 Howitzer

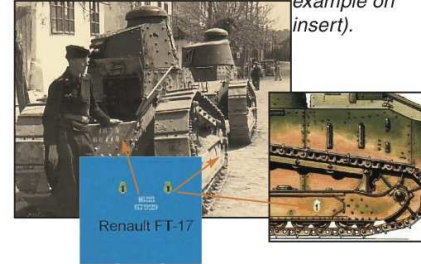


Zagreb, May 7th. Red stars in white roundels on the turret sides, hull sides and hull front.



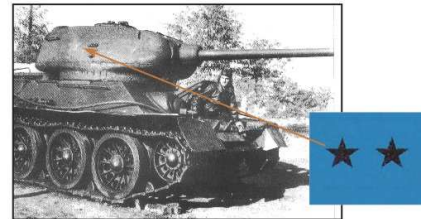
Renault FT-17

Serbia 1942. Tank in the original Yugoslav middark green. On the front hull two set of ID-numbers, on the cover of the wheels is a yellow flame grenade symbol with a '1' in it (see example on insert).



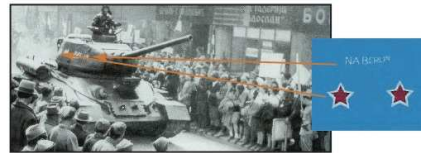
T34/85

April/may 1945, near Belgrade. Yugoslav 2nd Brigade. A red star on the side of the turret.



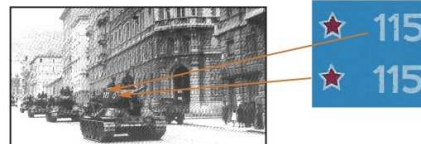

Zagreb, 1944. 2nd Armoured Brigade enter the town. On the turret a red star and slogan 'Target Berlin'.



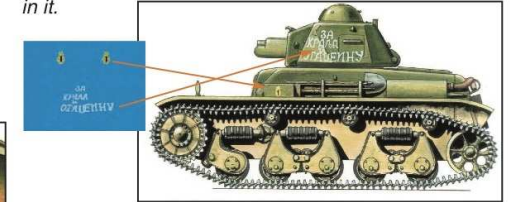

Triest, May 1945. The 2nd NOV Brigade of the Yugoslav Army. Though this primarily depicts number 111, the subject of this decal is the second tank, number 115.

Tank of the 2nd Yugoslav Tank Battalion, april 1941. Tank in Yugoslav middark green; slogan on turret, on the hull side a yellow flame grenade symbol with a '1' in it.
